
Nothing daunts him; he delights in privations, welcomes sacrifices, rejoices in being calumniated, and exults and glories in torments and persecutions.


#### From Father Prefect's Desk







Among his studies John prefers Physics. Consequently, after ordination he hopes to be a professor of Physics here at the postulate.


