# El Don, 1960



In the cool of the morning which was just beginning to be warmed by the rising sun, two very dissimilar men left the village and headed north. Though very dissimilar, they had very similar ideas. One went out to conquer and to plant, the other went out to plant and thus to conquer.

One, a Spanish don, with lace and ruffles, with sword and helmet, advanced on his prancing horse with spurs tinkling. His sharp, determined features betrayed undeniably the spirit that moved him. He was a pioneer. He was a conquerer, one of the renowned conquistadores of the king of Spain. He would conquer and then plant his master's flag in the valley and on the mountaintop. 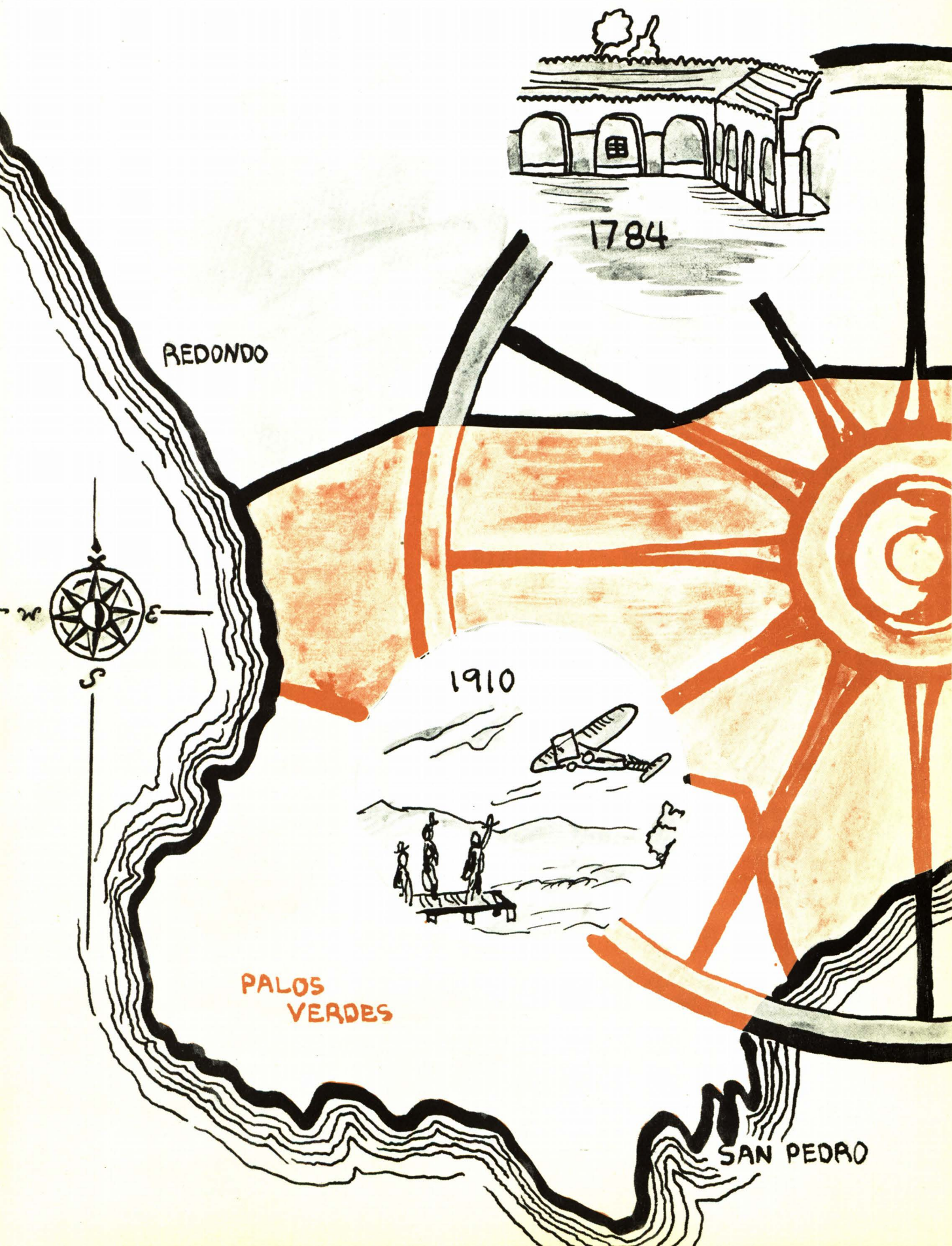



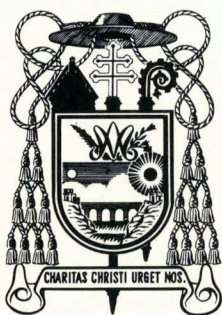

Father Michael Cecere, C.M.F., has been Provincial of the Western Province since last year. 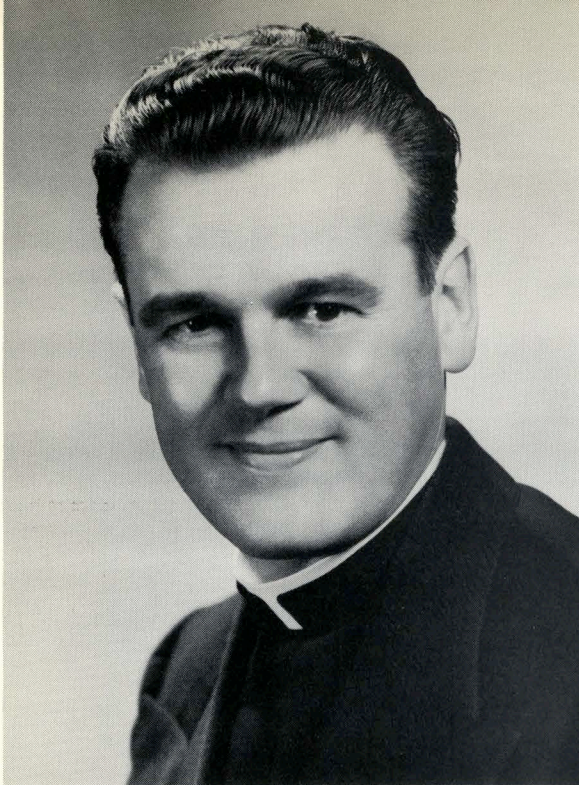

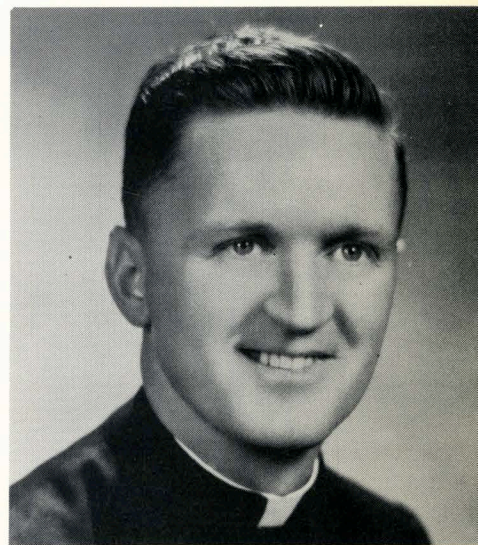




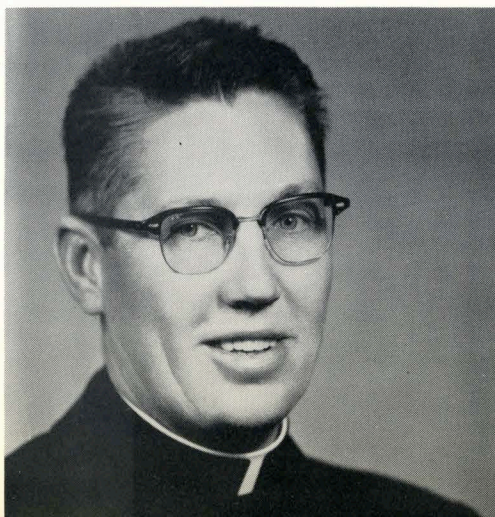

## *Superiors wish blessings.*

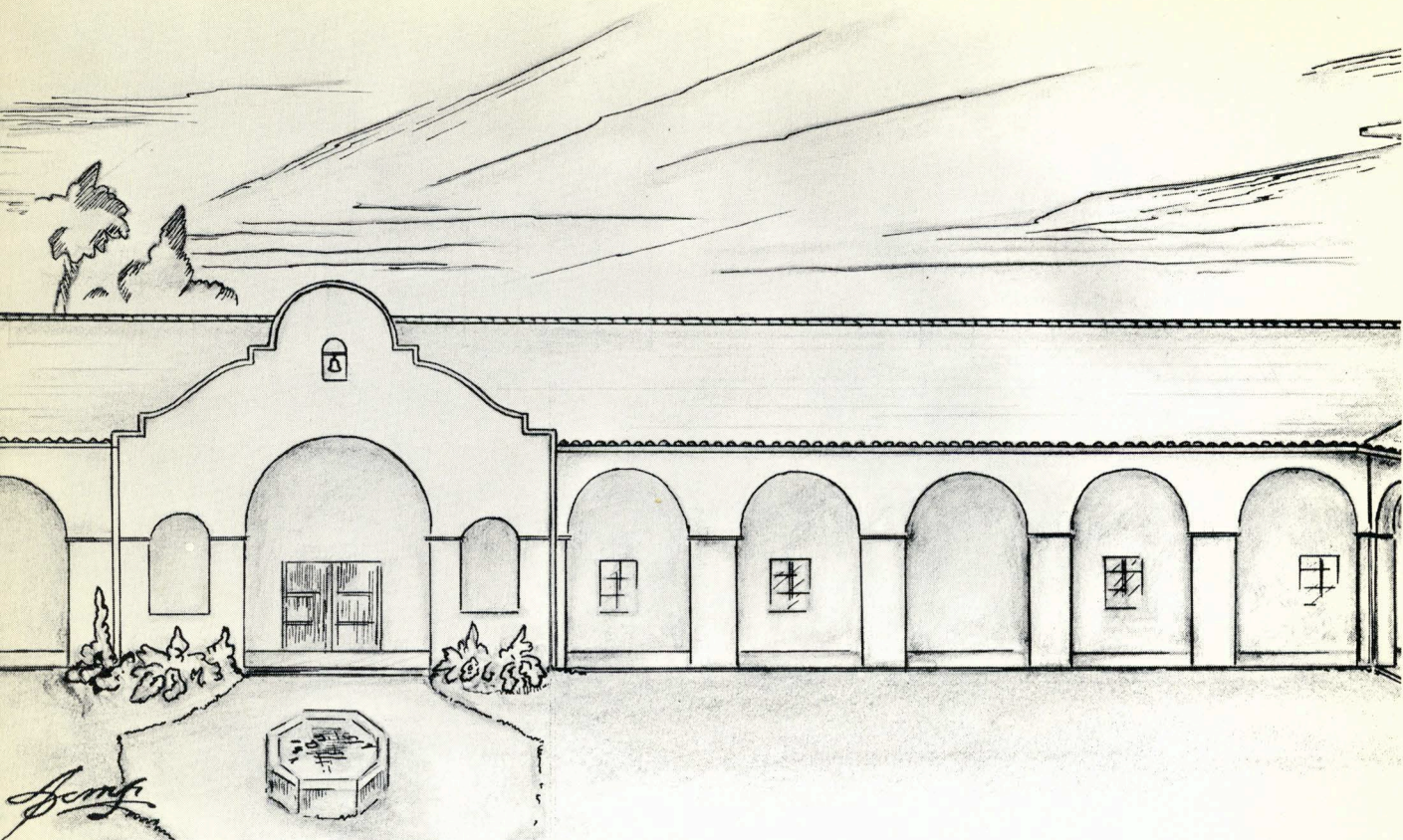

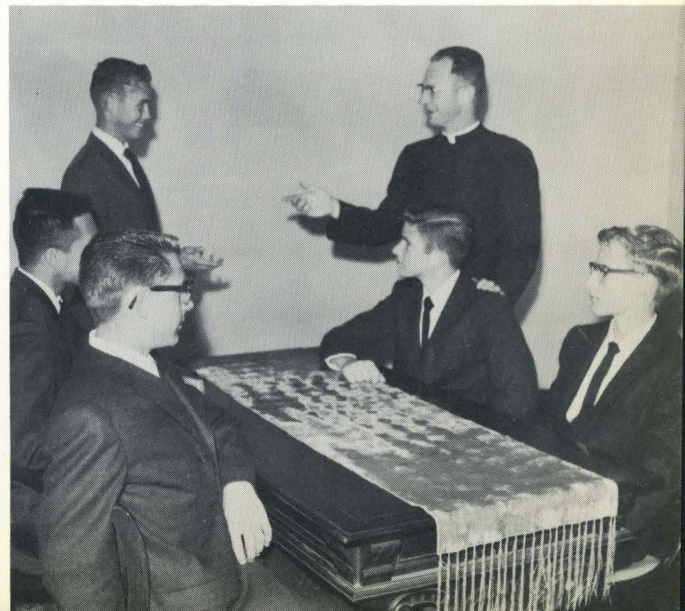

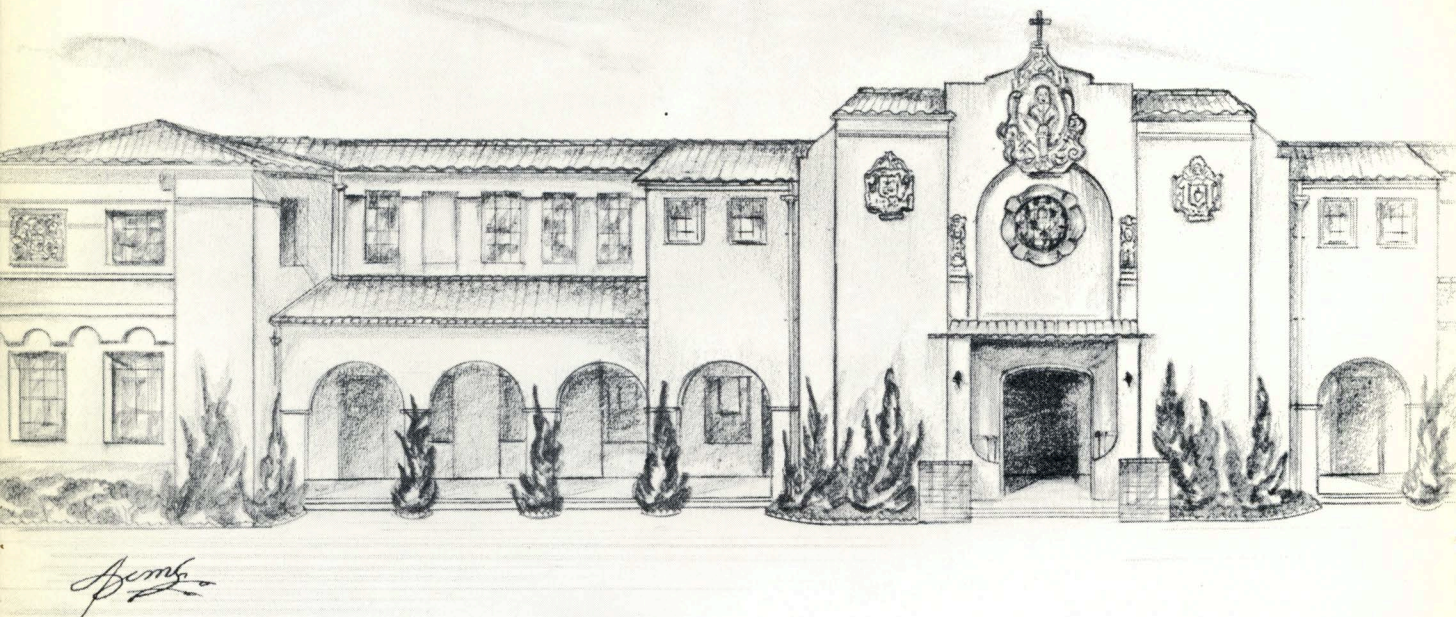

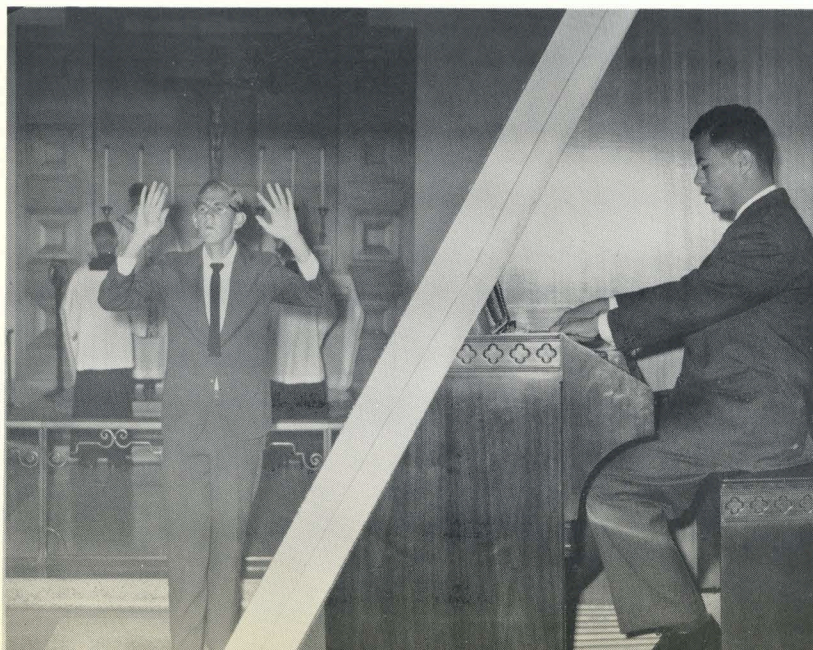

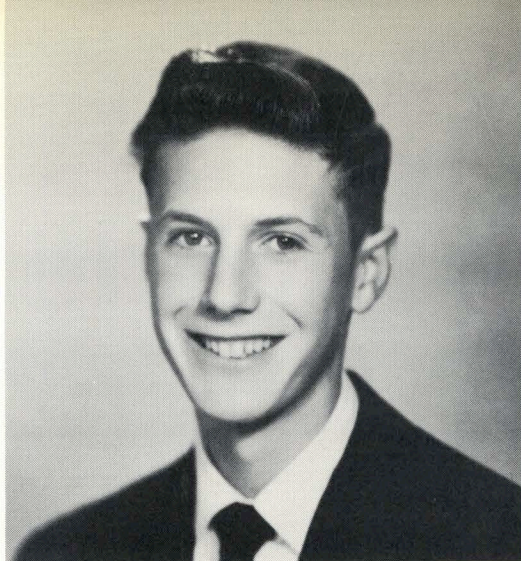
### Richard Lawrence, C.M.P.

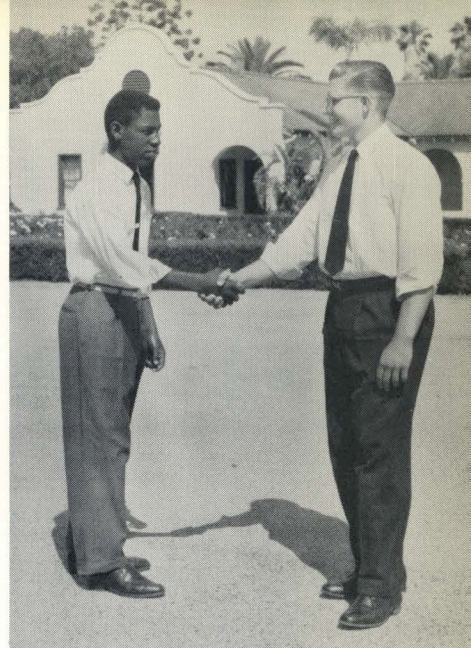

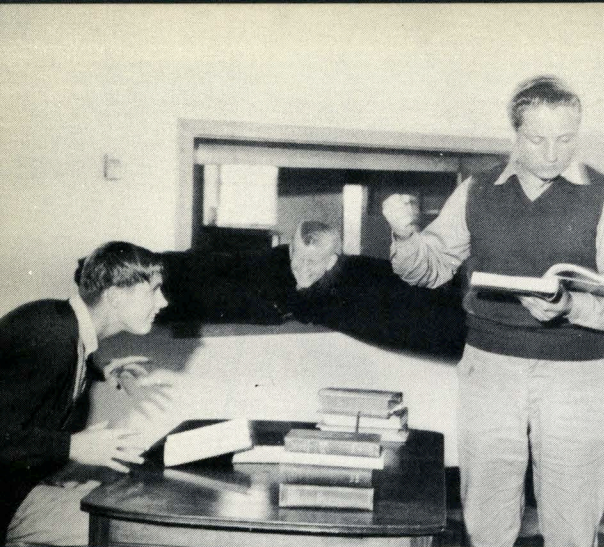
#### *Henry Perez, C.M.P.*
