





Father Ernest Hyman, C.M.F.



He is presently Financial Minister and professor at the college department in Calabasas, California.






FATHER ANTHONY TOMICICH, C.M.F.


FATHER FERMIN URRUTIA, C.M.F.


REV. EDWARD J. WIDMER, C.M.F.


Father Leo Delgado, C.M.F









Richard Carey, C.M.P. ST. JUSTIN'S, ANAHEIM

Richard will be remembered for his amicable service in the seminary tailor shop. His desire is to become a Brother and we know that the Congregation has a valuable member in him.






Gonzalo Martinez, C.M.P. ALL SAINT'S, FORT WORTH

Nicholas Majersky, C.M.P. st. Joseph's, Pomona


Nick was born on June 14, 1943, in Abilene, Texas.
