A vocation is a wonderful gift of God to be treasured, cared for and developed. On this much depends for the greater glory of God and the welfare of immortal souls. For this reason the Church has wisely established minor seminaries.

Pope Pius XII in an address Sept. 4, 1957, remarked that "The Church sees happy results achieved by minor seminaries in studies and in the formation of character. The young man who aspires to become a priest should mature in an environment favorable to a clear choice. The education of his still fragile will requires prudence and respect. He will, therefore, find in the minor seminaries experienced and attentive counsellors and teachers who will guide his steps, stimulate his intelligence and his feeling of responsibility.... May it please the Lord of the Harvest to send choice recruits to minor seminaries."

Our aim should be to pray and sacrifice that more boys accept the stirring challenge of Christ "Come follow me and I will make you fishers of men". In fact Pope Pius XII also stated that "Every Christian parent must pray to God to have at least one of their children called to His Service."

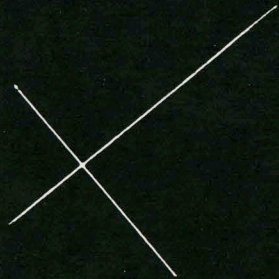
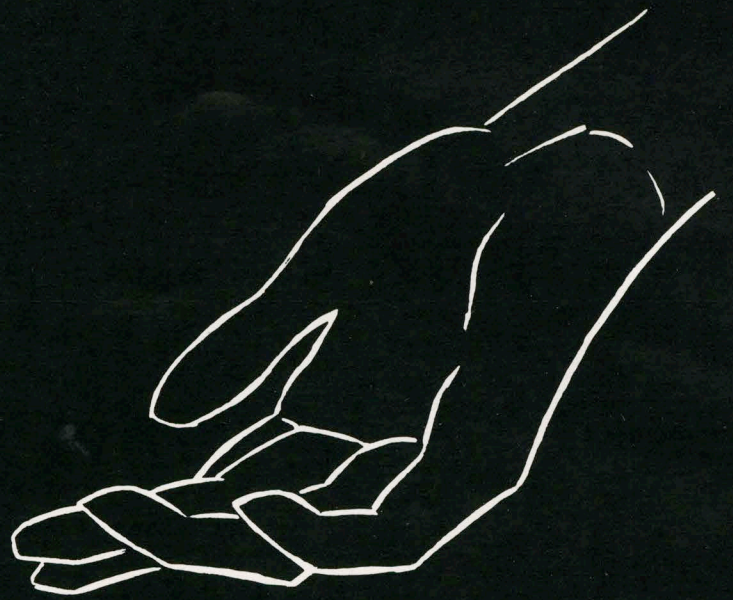

Heeding a call of a priestly vocation, Anthony entered the Seminary in Vich, and on June 13th, 1835, was raised to the Holy Priesthood. He founded the Claretian Congregation on July 16th, 1849. He was beatified on February 25th, 1934, by Pope Pius XI, who said, "Blessed Claret was indeed a great figure, a tireless apostle, moreover, a great organizer and a great precursor of Catholic Action." Blessed Claret was solemnly raised to the altars of the Catholic Church and proclaimed Saint by Pope Pius XII on the 7th of May, 1950.

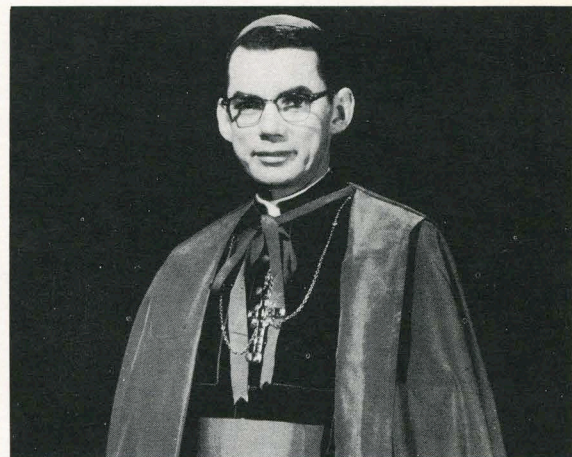

Father Schweiger was born in Geissirl, Germany on May 6, 1894 and made his first vows on August 15, 1912. After ordination to the Holy Priesthood on May 29, 1920 he was transferred to Rome where he obtained a doctor's degree in canon and civil law. He later distinguished himself as professor of canon law at San Anselmo. Previous to his first election as Superior General he was Provincial Superior of the German province. Father Schweiger was re-elected Superior General for a second term on May 10, 1951.

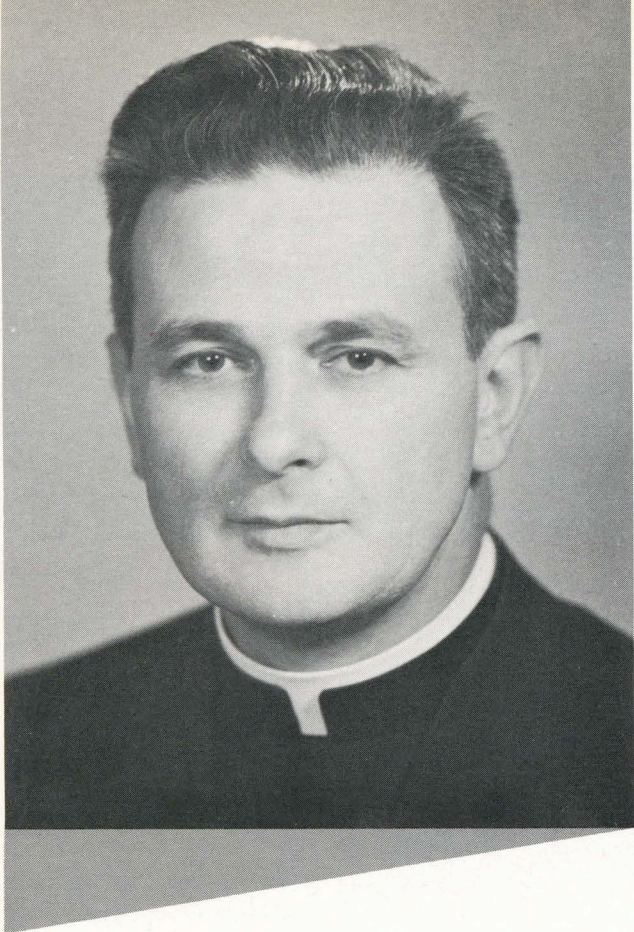

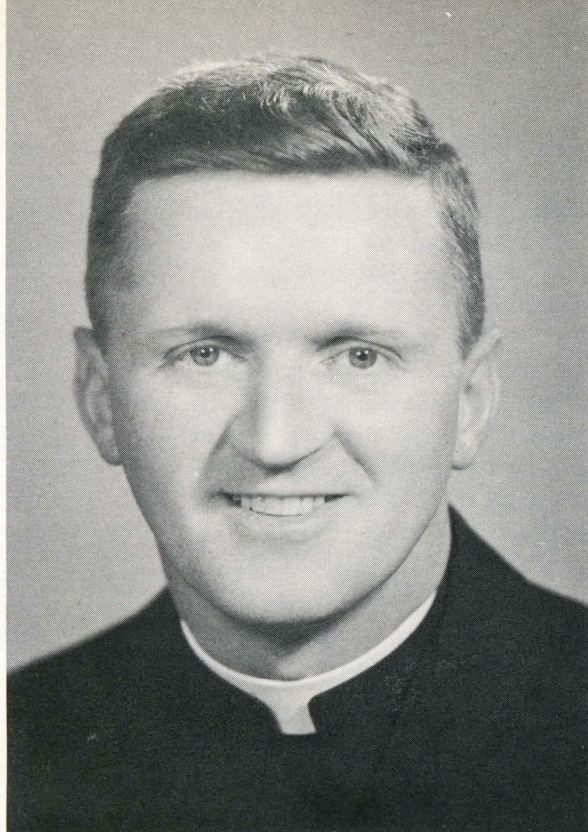
ear Graduates,

I recommend you to the Immaculate Heart of our dear mother. Stay close to her, and you need never fear the realization of your goal.



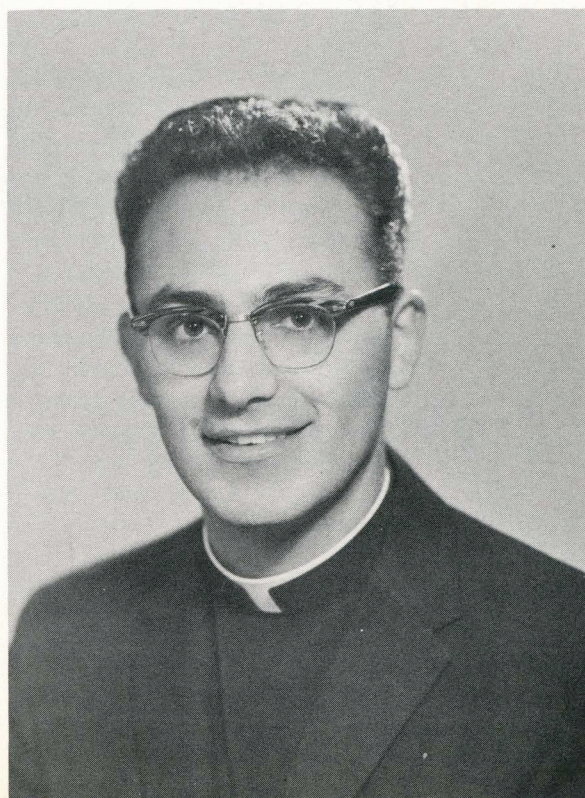
REV. JAMES GRIFFIN, C.M.F.

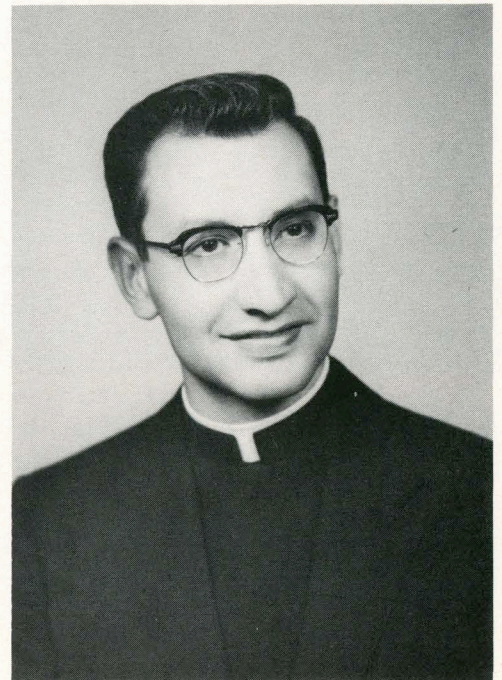
REV. JOHN FESSLER, C.M.F.

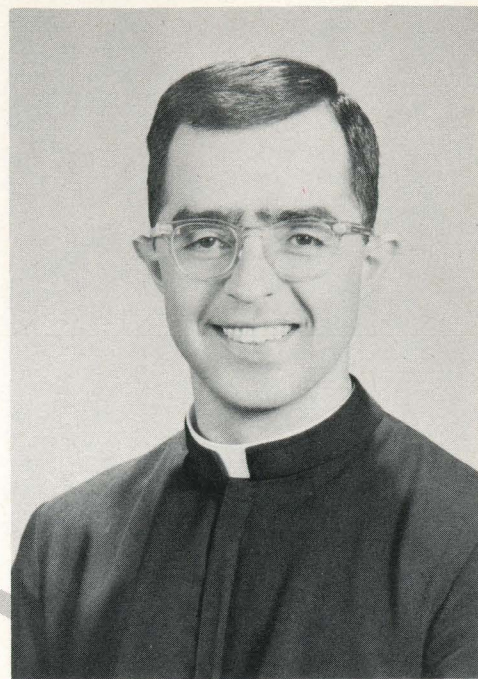
REV. LOUIS OLIVARES, C.M.F.

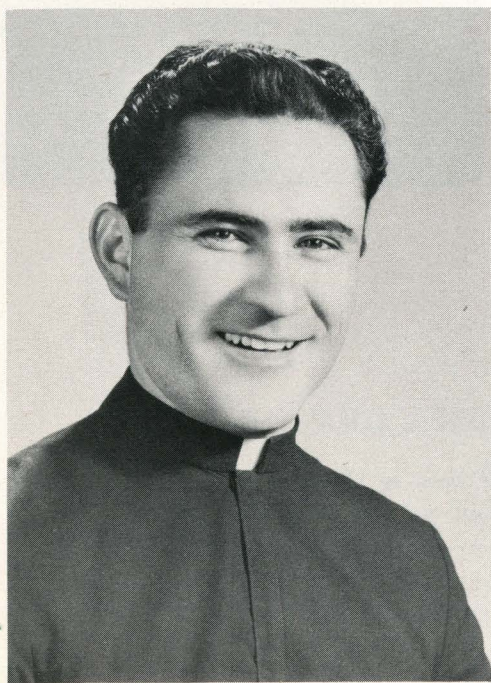


MR. ADOLPH ORTEGA, C.M.F.

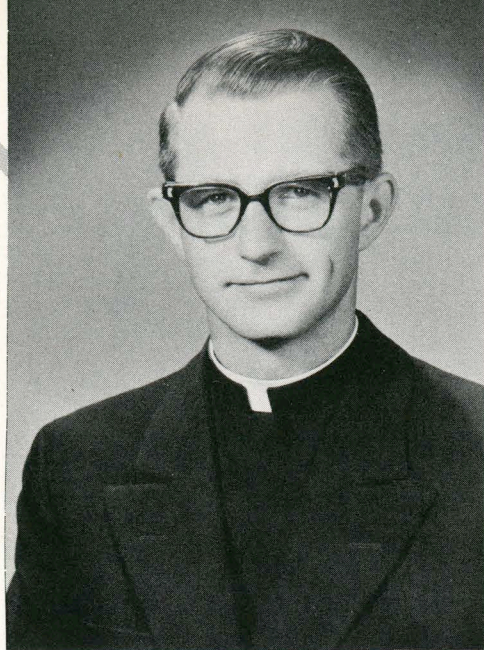

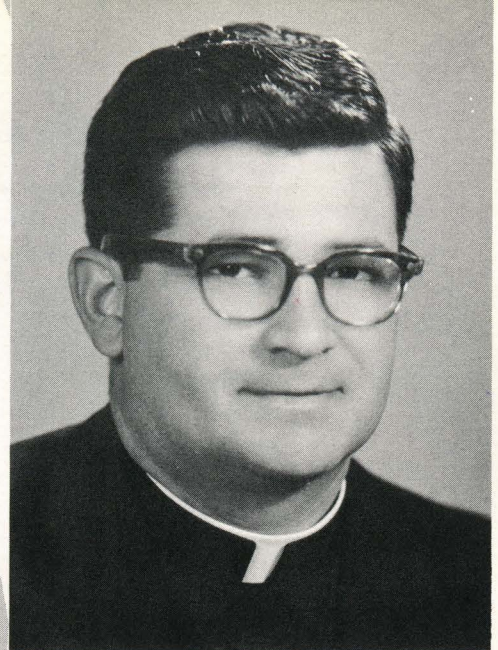


REV. EDWARD WIDMER, C.M.F.

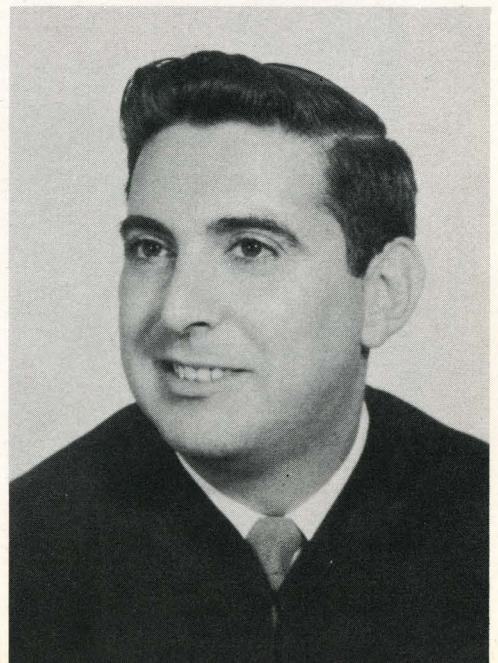


BRO. SALVATORE AZZARELLO, C.M.F.

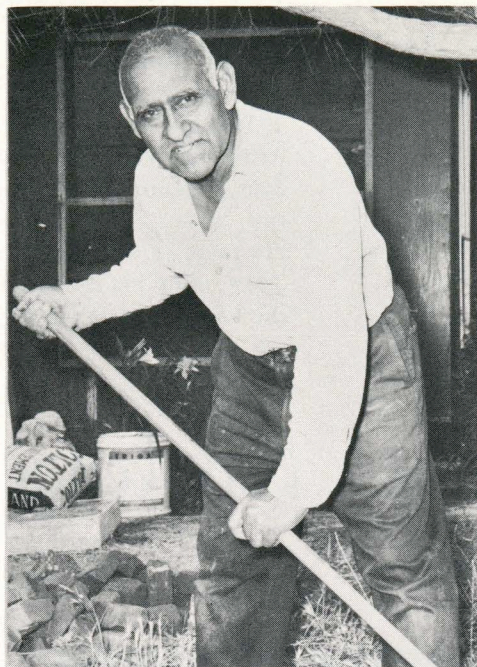
MR. SAMUEL LOMBARDO

BRO. SATURNINO RENDON, C.M.F.

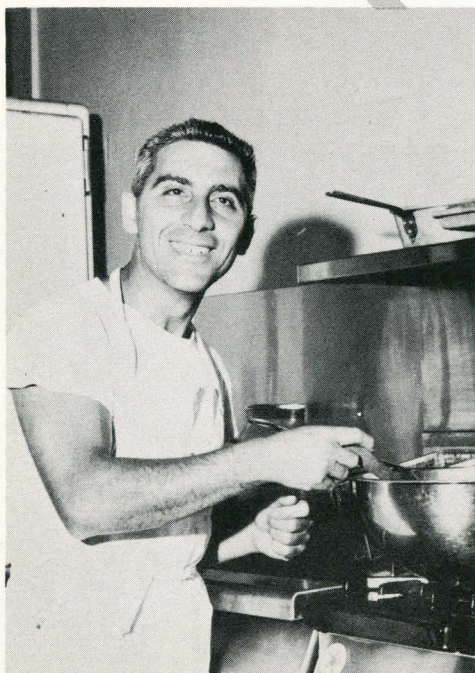

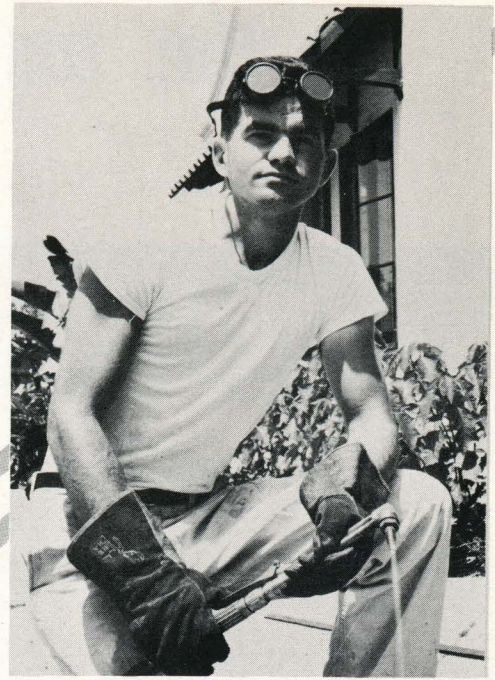
BRO. SAVERIO MOLINARI, C.M.F.

The story of Dominguez Rancho goes back to Dom Juan Jose Dominguez, born in Spain in 1719, who built the Rancho on what is known as Dominguez Hill. The 136 year-old rancho is now a museum, state landmark, and the old homestead is occupied by the Claretian Fathers.

Del Amo Foundation was built in 1935 through the generosity of Dr. Gregorio Del Amo who was married to Susanna Dominguez, a descendent of Don Juan Jose Dominguez. Their bodies lie in the crypt of Dominguez Seminary chapel, the first building built by them for aspirants to the priesthood.
