
### CLARETIAN LEADERS

We, the faculty and students here at Dominguez wish to our new General best wishes and Christ's blessings.







#### STUDENT COUNCIL


For the first time in our Minor Seminary's history a student government was set up and made into a helpful and working organization. After a week of campaigning elections were held September 24.




Snow Trip '68











#### Baseball '68

The El Don offers it's congratulations to the T.Y.C. and wishes it the best in the future.











## SENIOR HIKE


